It was the Pathfinder Parade, a tradition that began at the Grand Ledge camp meeting years ago, and was brought to Cedar Lake camp meeting, according to Pathfinder director, Craig Harris. That was about six years ago, but this time around, the parade included the Adventurers.

The Pathfinders were in full-dress uniform, and they held their flags and banners and marched proudly down the main road towards the main auditorium.

Parades also highlight the significance of club ministries to all of Michigan—to those who may not see its significance, as their church may not have a club ministry.

The Pathfinders and Adventurers, accompanied by

the drum choir, marched their way to Bathhouse 1, where a platform was set up. Along the way, groups of people were sitting or standing, cheering on the youth. On the platform was Craig Harris, director of club ministries; Jim Micheff, Michigan Conference president; Justin Ringstaff, executive secretary; and Terry Dodge, the previous director of club ministries. As they marched by, the young people and their leaders halted to salute the directors and officers.

After they had passed, all were invited into the auditorium for family worship. John Bradshaw was the main speaker. As the clubs filed into the auditorium, Tom Hubbard, associate ministerial director, led the youth in singing "Marching to Zion." The event culminated with Bradshaw's inspirational sermon to go out, and be used by God, no matter the mistakes that have been made in one's life.

As Harris shares, these young people are already allowing God to use them. High school students are part of the TLT (Teen Leaders in Training) program and are recognized by the Michigan Conference as staff members.
