
he loved him till the day she died. He was part of her, and you really couldn't talk about one without discussing the other. He was her protector, her provider, and she was the inspiration for his work.

The Protestant Reformation: Finished or Finishing?

arly Christianity introduced a powerful new element into human civilization. The apostolic church was in possession of the mind of Christ, and they turned the world upside down! The resurrected Jesus, though seated at the right hand of God, was alive in their hearts by means of the Holy Spirit.

For a while the Roman Empire simply considered the Christians another sect of the Jews. But it wasn't long before the Romans began to find Christians everywhere. Like the leaven in dough they permeated the Roman Empire.

The Romans were very religious and would have been willing to add Jesus to their list of gods. But the Christians would have none of it. It was this exclusiveness that threatened the Romans. To surrender their gods, which they believed had made them the envy of the world, was unthinkable. In the end, Christianity prevailed as countless numbers flocked to the selfless message and love of Christians.

But the Apostles predicted that wolves in sheep's clothing would enter among Christians, "not sparing the flock." Eventually, the *man of sin* would arise, transforming a large portion of the church into a "prostitute."

Approximately 300 years after the birth of Christ, the Roman Emperor Constantine declared that he had converted to Christianity. But it was not the same Christianity that had ignited the early church. As the Roman Empire began to crumble, it was a

prostituted form of Christianity that filled the vacuum.

So began the trajectory that would eventually lead to the Dark Ages. There were voices in that dark period such as John Wycliffe, John Hus, and the Waldensians that called the harlot church back to the Bible. But the papacy continued to produce mortifying shame and corruption. The ignorance and scandal of the clergy, plus the sadistic inquisition, only deepened the depravity of Europe. By the time of Luther in 1517, the darkness could hardly have been darker.

The trigger for the Reformation was a priest by the name of Johann Tezel. He was sent by Pope Leo X to Germany to raise money for the building of St. Peter's Cathedral. Tezel's job was to sell indulgences. For a price, the papal indulgences promised forgiveness for past and future sins! But what was the price? It was ducats—gold or silver coins used as currency during the Middle Ages, and not repentance!²

Prior to this, a monk by the name of Martin Luther had been studying at the University of Erfurt. There he discovered a Latin Bible. Martin Luther was devoted and fearless to perform the will of God. As he read the entire Bible for the first time he was overwhelmed with reverence and awe. Later, when he was called to teach at the University of Wittenberg, his Bible-based preaching moved hearts in a powerful way. This propelled Luther towards a confrontation with the papacy.³

Like thousands of other devout individuals seeking peace, Luther just about ruined his health in a monastery by beating his body, and through other forms of infliction. For many, indulgences were also easier to come by if you had money. But most Germans were poor. In order to purchase indulgences, people often denied themselves and their families the most basic necessities.

Luther had discovered the gospel, and thus Tetzel's worthless indulgences outraged him. Nailing the 95 Thesis' to the door of the Wittenberg cathedral he unwittingly started the Protestant Reformation, which for many, ended the futile pursuit of salvation through indulgences. Salvation was free! Individuals only had to put their trust in Jesus! As this light and other truths permeated the world, hundreds of years of "intellectual, political, social, economic, and religious stagnation ended."

The Protestant Reformation initiated the principles and foundations of modern European civilization, which ultimately birthed the American Constitution. The resulting civil and religious freedoms produced the greatest civil and economic engines the world has ever known. These engines drove back papal darkness, crushed Nazism, upended atheistic communism, and established human freedom as a fundamental right.

Over the past 500 years Satan has relentlessly attacked the Reformation. We have seen this with the establishment of the Jesuits and can trace Satan's opposition through the course of history.

Currently, influential voices are declaring that the protest of Rome is over. Ecumenical agreements between Protestants and Rome now dominate the headlines. Nevertheless, the book of Revelation predicts that what began with the Reformation would ultimately be completed! A remnant coming out of Protestantism would have a "bitter" experience. But they would be resurrected and *again* preach the everlasting gospel. In turn, Satan

would oppose the remnant and their message and resurrect the might of the papacy that would align with apostate Protestantism.

Here is a secret that most Americans do not understand. Our republic is dependent on the good deeds of its citizens. If you have to put a policeman on every corner, tyranny will follow. In America, until recent times people and property were generally safe. This was largely due to Protestant churches preaching the Bible. This was a Christian nation, not on the basis of legislation, but because of God's transforming power and the moral underpinnings of Scripture.

But over time, mainline Protestant seminaries abandoned their trust in Scripture and traded faithfulness for sentimental love. Consequently, their doors were opened to evolution, sexual abominations, and infidelity. They embraced the methods adopted by the entertainment world, utilizing drama, secular music, and comedians to attract members. Yet their churches are, by and large, empty.

What about our nation? The majority of our young are preoccupied with fame and fortune. Marriage has become irrelevant. Pornography is now an acceptable form of entertainment. Many women are sacrificing their hallowed bodies for profit. Many men are loyal to nothing, except hedonistic pleasure. The nation has moved from faith to feeling, and from feeling to apathy, and from apathy to hopelessness. Cynicism, depression, and confusion are fueling suicides by the thousands.

This condition is the result of Protestants abandoning the principle of *sola scriptura*. They have attempted to embrace a decadent culture instead of rebuking it with the faithful biblical preaching. Protestantism has lost relevance. It has become a Christ-less church.

The Evangelicals have held onto a semblance of *sola scriptura*. They are alarmed at the moral rotting of the nation; but

sadly, they have abandoned their trust in the transforming power of the Holy Spirit and have formed an alliance with the papacy.

They believe that such an alliance will prevent the nation from going down the path of moral degradation. But they have gambled and lost. Now the Pope has become the religious leader of the nation, instead of the Billy Graham's of our day.

Nevertheless, the Protestant Reformation's attempt to return to primitive godliness and apostolic love of the apostolic church will not fail! The Bible predicts that a remnant "who keep the commandments of God and the faith of Jesus" will lighten the earth with God's glory. They will successfully call God's people to come out of Babylon. Listen to these glorious predictions:

"Christ is waiting with longing desire for the manifestation of Himself in His church. When the character of Christ shall be perfectly reproduced in His people, then He will come to claim them as His own."⁵

"Notwithstanding the agencies combined against the truth, a large number [will] take their stand upon the Lord's side."

The rallying cry of the Protestant Reformation has not been lost. The principles of the Reformation embodied in the terms—sola scriptura, sola grace, and sola faith—which stand for Scripture, grace, and faith alone, respectively, will triumph over all the forces of evil!

Dear reader, let us seize anew that cry and renew our commitment to be part of the remnant; a remnant that will complete what the Reformation started 500 years ago!



WHERE IS YOUR TREASURE?

n Luke chapter 12, Jesus tells the story of a man whose business was so successful that he didn't have the capacity to store all of his bounty. Therefore, he determined to build bigger warehouses to accumulate all that he had gained.

However, he didn't live long enough to enjoy the riches and the life of ease he coveted. The divine judgment was "This night your soul will be required of you; then whose will those things be which you have provided?"

What was Jesus trying to teach us? In the verse preceding this parable Jesus warned us to "beware of covetousness." In this

context we might conclude that the rich man coveted what was already his own. After all, he had earned what he wanted to keep. There is no suggestion that he had defrauded anyone or cheated God in order to gain what he had. So where is the problem?

Some time ago I was blessed by a sermon from one of our Michigan pastors who said: "God doesn't count how much you give; He counts how much you keep." This is the essence of stewardship. God blesses us with means to provide for our own family, but with our abundance

He asks us to consider *others* who are in need. What made the rich man covetous was his unwillingness to share his bounty with those in need.

God doesn't expect us to neglect our own family needs in order to give offer-

ings to support charitable entities. However, He does take an accounting of what we do with the resources he entrusts to us. Of the rich man Jesus said: "So is he who lays up treasure for himself, and is not rich toward God." Jesus' counsel is, "Sell what you have and give alms; provide yourselves money in heaven that doesn't fail. . . For where

your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

One way of laying up treasure in heaven while still providing needed income to live on is through a Charitable Gift Annuity (CGA). This instrument offers you the opportunity to give a gift to God while maintaining a steady income to sustain you.
